Report from the AERA Program Chair for AERA 2011 - New Orleans

We have a very exciting program scheduled for AERA New Orleans. This vear the SIG received 38 proposal submissions and one proposal for a symposium. Based on our membership numbers, AERA allotted the SIG with one paper session, two roundtable sessions, two symposia, and one business meeting. Therefore, we were able to accept a total of 15 papers, in addition to the two symposia; this gave us a respectable acceptance rate of 39% for the 2011 program.

Our paper session, Leadership, Decision Making, and School Schools, was allotted a twohour block enabling us to include five papers. Our two roundtable sessions, (1) Concerns and Issues in Young Adolescent Development and (2) Varying Literacies in Educating Today's Young Adolescents,

each include five papers. Additionally, we have two symposia this year, (1) Middle School Teachers Listen to Students as Part of Professional Develop-Improvement in Middle Level ment and Teacher Education and (2) The National Project on Middle Level Common Planning Time: Emergent Research.

NEWS FROM THE EXECUTIVE ADVISOR

Vincent A. Anfara, Jr., The University of Tennessee

I wanted to take this opportunity to provide some information regarding the moratorium on SIGs that has been in effect since June 2009 and will continue until June 30, 2011. By way of context, there are currently 185 SIGs that comprise AERA with about 45% of AERA's membership belonging to one or more SIGs. SIGs were first introduced into AERA in 1967 and by 1973 there were 43 SIGs.

Issues related to SIGs have appeared and reappeared since SIGs were created. Such issues revolve around minimum number of members, session allocation at the annual meeting, and other governance related matters dealing with SIG bylaws, length of term of

officers, AERA membership of SIG members, election procedures, and the like.

As the AERA SIG Executive Committee engages in the data collection efforts to help address the current issues and provide a report to the AERA Executive Council, many of you responded to a survey (SIG Membership Feedback Survey) about SIGs that was administered via Survey-Monkey immediately before, and after, the 2010 AERA annual meeting. Thanks, if you provided your data.

It is interesting to note that SIGs that are below 100 members, on the average, receive only about 10.5 proposal submissions. The range of the number of proposals for these SIGs is from 0 to 34. It is also important to note that some very large SIGs with membership numbers in the 300s are receiving as few as 50 and as many as 150 proposals for review. According to 2010 data, the MLER SIG with 185 members received 37 proposals for review. While it would be great to receive more proposals for review, we are certainly doing well with proposal submissions.

As of this time, 14 SIGs have not submitted their revised bylaws. These "delinquent" SIGs range in size from 41 to 385 members. A small number of SIGs are having difficulty in adjusting to the new AERA election procedures with electronic voting and at least two nominees for each vacant position being elected. NMSA 2010 Annual Conference MLER-SIG Business Meeting Notes

November 5, 2010 - Baltimore, Maryland Cynthia Reyes, University of Vermont

Penny's Welcome and an Overview of the Agenda:

Contributions and kudos to the past leadership of MLER SIG. Explanation of the different working groups: strategic planning, outreach, recognition, leadership development and publication. Penny highlighted the upcoming elections

Executive Advisor Report (Vince Anfara)

Vince's term ends in AERA, New Orleans, 2011. There is currently a moratorium on SIGS. The moratorium is based on a few SIGs that have not followed the by-laws. Vince is currently actively serving on an AERA leadership committee that oversees the governance of SIGs. Our SIG membership is around 200. Our SIG is in good standing with AERA; for example, it revised and returned the by-laws by the first round.

MLER SIG has received compliments from previous leaderships in the field and the website is considered one of the best. Currently, Vince's committee is reviewing the surveys on SIGs. They are also reviewing the connections between SIGS and Divisions – issues with size where a SIG is larger than a division.

Handbook series: George Johnson is publisher of Information Age Publishing. George contacted Vince in 2000 to talk about publishing a series of handbooks. As of today, 8 have been published and 1 encyclopedia. About a week ago, Kathy Malu edited the last handbook, an exploration of the methods of narrative. The main part of the title is "Voices from the Middle: Narrative Inquiry By, For and About the Middle Level Community."

Treasurer's Report (Shawn Faulkner)

Currently, the SIG has a balance of \$4,007.93, which includes an itemized list. Vince clarified one item on the budget \$750, which was paid to CPRD from the University of Illinois, related to Phase II data collection.

Program Chair Report (Steve Mertens)

Steve gave an overview of the MLER SIG @ AERA 2011 submissions—there were 38 proposal and 1 symposium submissions. 15 papers were accepted with an acceptance rate of 36%. Some SIGs have an acceptance rate of 90% or above, but our submissions reflect a good, healthy competition. The program consists of 1 paper session, 2 roundtable sessions, 2 symposia, and 1 business meeting. Steve highlighted AERA's attempt to privilege poster sessions and the roundtable. He also discussed the rationale for not offering a poster session at AERA this year (It might not be seen by tenure committees as valuable as the roundtable/ paper sessions), and the point system breakdown.

Someone asked if this formula was still driven by numbers that participate in the SIG. Steve clarified that we lost one session. AERA makes its decisions after looking at membership total and the number of submission of proposals. Submissions are down this year. We will once again remind members to submit proposals. Membership generally occurs in January.

Steve went over the Paper Sessions and the Program Reviewers (Provided in the PowerPoint slide portion of the Business Meeting)

Program reviewers reviewed 10 or more papers. A question was raised on the absence of discussants for the two symposia. Steve emphasized the challenge of asking a member to read, review and then discuss a number of 5 papers.

Working Groups Report: Nominations (Chris Cook)

At present there are 3 council seats available and 1 graduate student seat. We need a total of 6 nominees according to the bylaws, in addition to two graduate students. Chris talked about the value of being part of this SIG and the value of service on the tenure papers is important. Please send nominations to Chris Cook (Cookc2@nku.edu) or Penny Bishop (pbishop@uvm.edu)

Outreach (Molly Mee) Purpose of the committee is

up to our membership. This group will be setting its priorities to retain current members, promote our SIG, and to involve more graduate students. One goal is to find out how many grad students we already have. We have 185 current members, 39 new, 104 lapsed members. We hope to create s SIG advertisement flyer to distribute, as well as social networking options. Is there a reduced membership rate for graduate students? Yes, a considerable discount rate for AERA membership for grad students.

Leadership Development (Kenneth Anderson)

Looks at opportunities of mentoring and pairing a veteran mentor and new scholar.

Publications (Chris Cook)

There are 3 outlets that are available for us as SIG members: Handbook Series, a publication that parallels the Common Planning Time project, Phase II, and the Chronicle that comes out three times a year with a peerreviewed article. Submissions should be sent to Chris Cook (cookc2@nku.edu). Comes out in January, June and October. Please send literature reviews, etc. Also mentioned the RMLE (Research in the Middle Level Education Online), which is edited by Karen Swanson. The question was raised about how many submissions have been sent to the Chronicle. For the Handbook, Vince noted the 8 handbooks and described (Continued on page 5)

(Continued from page 2) first to submit its revised bylaws and these have been approved by AERA Executive Council and our membership in last year's election process administered through AERA.

Looking at graduate student membership provides some noteworthy information. Graduate students comprise from 4.17% to 63.11% of a SIG's total membership. The MLER SIG is currently at 16.22% student membership with 30 out of 185 total members being graduate students.

I hope you have taken the opportunity to register for AERA Chair: Nan Bahr 2011. I am a member of the Program Planning Committee and there are some great sessions being planned for New Orleans that focus on Katrina and its effects on the local school system—both PK-12 and higher education.

Recently you received an email about registering as a reviewer for AERA 2012. I know our program Chair, Dr. Steve Mertens, would be grateful if you would register to serve the SIG in this capacity.

Thanks are also due to the many reviewers who spent time thoughtfully critiquing proposals, the individuals who submitted their work for consideration, and those who offered to serve as chairs and discussants. A listing of all sessions appears in this issue of the Chronicle.

One of the presentations at AERA 2011 will feature the National Middle Grades Research Program. The MLER SIG launched this ongoing and successful program in 2006 in order to

develop a national database on middle-grades education issues for research. Now in Phase II, the program has prepared researchers to conduct teacher surveys about CPT practices, benefits, outcomes, and its impact on students and teachers. Thanks to Steve Mertens, SIG Program Chair; Vince Anfara, SIG Executive Advisor; Micki Caskey, SIG Past-Chair; and Nancy Flowers, of the Center for Prevention Research and Development, for their invaluable leadership of this phase. Please visit our SIG website to learn more about the CPT project and about how to propose similar middle grades research projects that are national or international in scope.

As we look ahead, another exciting SIG initiative is our increasing focus on mentoring graduate students. Our Leadership Development Working Group is in the midst of creating an informal mentorship program, designed to link graduate students with veteran scholars in middle grades education research. In closing, please note that AERA's 2011 election was recently completed. On the ballot were candidates for AERA officers, a proposed amendment of AERA bylaws, and candidates for council

(Continued from page 3) how the call is always sent out, yet the call is never sufficient enough to make a book.

Recognition (Shawn Faulkner)

This group is responsible for taking care of awards we use to recognize members. The two awards our SIG presents at AERA include a graduate student award and the Lipka Lifetime Achievement award. Nominees for the Lipka award is open until Dec. 31st and the criteria is on the MLER website. We've had opportunity to submit an additional award for research. Shawn is requesting for more input from the members. Should the award be for a

significant piece of scholarly work or should it be an award for a significant body of work in middle level education research? He would like some input before they approach the AERA for application of this new award. The possibility of numbering citations was mentioned. But there is an issue that not all citations are reflected in the middle level education journals.

A question was raised about using one or both. Lipka mentioned an example of a piece of work that changed the character of a field, which was actually a dissertation. Lipka stressed the importance of keeping

open to this type of significant research that changes the direction of a field, albeit a single piece. What criteria will we use to qualify a good piece of research? Vince stressed the rationale for offering this third award. Originally, they wanted to recognize a member of the SIG who has contributed a piece of significant research.

Could we examine the criteria of the Palmer Johnson award and to see whether it makes sense? We could also pull together criteria from different research committees in other organizations that have these criteria (Example: teacher research award, National Council of Teachers of English). It was suggested

that we look at the general patterns of criteria.

Companion Series (Steve Mertens)

Over the past couple of years, there have been proposals sent to the Handbook that were more practice-related and therefore they brainstormed the idea of creating a parallel series. There is a book that has been submitted on the origins of the founding fathers and mothers of middle level education, but did not seem appropriate for the Handbook of Research Series. There was mention of a collaboration of the SIG with NAPOMLE and this special Handbook could (Continued on page 6)

also be an outlet for this kind of research. Vincent shared the current experience in Pennsylvania where middle level education was recently created. He stressed the advantage that this type of Handbook/book could have had for administrators and teachers in Pennsylvania who were creating courses, syllabi, and other materials for a licensure program in middle level education, as well as a valuable resource for us all.

Is there a risk of melding both practice and research? One of the criticisms that we in education receive is the separation between research and practice. Tariq mentioned that in our conference today, NMSA has been asked policy questions by the federal government. As a SIG we should strive to collaborate with the National Forum to accelerate Middle Level Education research. Steve and Nancy Flowers were also invited to present on Common Planning Time.

Closer connection to NAPOMLE – this resource Handbook would be a good connection to NAPOMLE. Mentioned the website at North Carolina that reflected the same kind of resources that we describe with this new Handbook.

John Niska (Outgoing President – NAPOMLE)

Described the work that NAPOMLE has been doing and efforts to honor John Lounsbury via the Legacy Project. May 18-20 is set aside to honor significant figures. The Southern Group has had their regional conference (from 15 states). John received positive feedback about joining NAPOMLE to the beginning of the NMSA conference. There will be more advertisement the next year. They have been concerned with the visibility of their organization and they integrated the new awards, which will bring more visibility. They welcome

the collaboration with MLER SIG.
